Some of the books I have shared and will be sharing with Pre-School—Grade 1 (and some also with the 2/3's) are:

"A Bear in War" which is set * in 1916, amid the First World War where a little Canadian teddy bear travelled to France in a care package for Aileen's daddy. Lieutenant Lawrence Browing Rogers. Today, that very same teddy bear is displayed at the Canadian War Museum. This story is by Stephanie Innes (greatoranddauohter to Lt. Lawrence) and Harry Endrulat. The beautiful artwork of Brian Deines creates a very moving piece of literature that I am proud to share with our students.



"Clifford the Big Red Dog" * and "Small Red Puppy" stories (series/character creator Norman Bridwell) were read during the third week of November. We learned about love, kindness, caring and giving * with these stories.

- Animal Christmas stories were featured in the last week of November and I was happy to share some of my favorite stories. First, entitled "A Pussycat's Christmas" by Margaret Wise Brown. We also read "Moon & Star" by Robin Muller and Winter's Gift" by Jane Monroe Davidson.
- We will learn about Christmas around the world and other cultural celebrations including Kwanzaa and Hanukkah during the first week of December.
